LEADER BIO



John Musselman is the President of the Jackson Institute, a leadership development organisation whose mission is to contribute to the cultural, intellectual, and spiritual formation of individuals who are on a passionate quest to be welcomed, received, and acknowledged by God. He studied at the University of Alabama (BS in Mathematics), Reformed Theological Seminary (MDiv), and Fuller Theological Seminary (DMin). After serving on the staffs of Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida and Perimeter Church in Atlanta, he founded the Jackson Institute in 1991. John's passion is reflected in the vision of the Jackson Institute: "to permeate the kingdom of God with reproducing leaders." He has authored *Classic Discipleship*, a manual for equipping leaders in Christian

discipleship, and *The Holy Spirit and His Gifts*. In addition, he has edited John Bunyan's *The Pilgrim's Progress*, A.B. Bruce's classic work, *The Training of the Twelve*, and Thomas Watson's *Man's Chief End: God's Glory*. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Atlanta, Georgia.



Wojtek Kowalewski is the President of Golden Apple Institute based in Poland, an organization whose mission is to equip leaders to be disciplemakers. He is an ordained pastor with a PhD in Practical Theology from the University of Wales in Cardiff. His doctoral thesis was published under the title, "Transforming Mission in a Post-Communist Context: Towards an Integrative Approach." He is the author of numerous international and Polish publications, both academic and popular, and speaks at numerous academic and marketplace conferences on leadership, missions, and discipleship. Wojtek is the head of the School of Biblical Discipleship, which is a nine-month intensive training program committed to equipping men and women in biblical disciplemaking for multiplicative and multi-

generational impact. He is also the director of the Billy Graham Institute of Evangelism and Discipleship at the Baptist Theological Seminary in Warsaw. Wojtek serves on the National Board of the Baptist Union of Poland. He is an experienced coach and mentor to many leaders and his passion is helping people get from where they are to where God wants them to be. He and his wife, Agnieszka, live in Wroclaw, Poland.

OVERVIEW

GOAL: To provide Christian leaders with comprehensive training in disciplemaking, including biblical and theological foundations; historic and contemporary applications and methods; and a careful analysis of every stage in the discipling process. This initiative seeks to:

1. Foster personal development in the context of peer relationships.
2. Strengthen a commitment to disciple others in the words and ways of Jesus.
3. Encourage a passion and devotion for training a new generation of mature, reproducing leaders for the exponential spread of the gospel throughout Europe and beyond.

PLAN:

1. An Online Pre-Forum meeting with all participants on Thursday, 13 May 2021, exact time TBA.
2. A four-day private Network at the 2021 Online European Leadership Forum (15–19 May 2021, exact times TBA);
3. A one-on-one Zoom session with John and a separate one with Wojtek during the 2021 Online Forum;
4. Six two-hour webinars with webinar assignments between the 2021 and 2022 Forums;
5. A 4-day retreat near Barcelona, Spain from in December 2021 (exact times TBA);

6. A Pre-Forum Conference before the 2022 ELF on Friday evening and Saturday (all day), 20-21 May.

PARTICIPANTS: Eight to twelve Christian leaders who are highly interested: (1) in furthering their understanding of how Jesus trained the twelve Apostles to reach the world with the gospel; (2) in developing and improving their knowledge and skills in biblical discipling; (3) in learning more about the process of personal sanctification and how people grow to maturity in Christ; (4) in engaging in spiritual multiplication to help reach the world with the gospel of Jesus Christ; (5) in becoming a part of a healthy, committed learning community; and (6) in fulfilling all of the requirements for participating in the Year-Round Initiative.

QUALIFICATIONS: Actively involved in evangelism and discipleship, and a spiritually mature evangelical leader.

COMMITMENTS: In order to be accepted as a participant, you must:

1. Complete and submit an application to ELF.
2. Attend all sessions, including the four-day private Network sessions at the Online Forum in 2021 a one-on-one Zoom meeting with John during the 2020 Forum; a one-on-one Zoom meeting with Wojtek during the 2020 Forum; the six webinar sessions throughout the year (September, October, November, January, February, March); the 4-day retreat in December 2021; and the Pre-Forum Conference in 2022.
3. Access all webinars on a computer with a good broadband internet connection, a quality webcam, and a headset.
4. Secure a copy of each of the books required to complete the Network assignments.
5. Read a selection of pre-assigned materials before each webinar. These assignments will consist of selected books and articles related to the webinar's focus. Writing assignments are also an important aspect of webinar preparation.
6. Complete and submit all assignments at least one week before each webinar.
7. Read *Transforming Discipleship* by Greg Ogden (Downers Grove: InterVarsity Press, 2003. 202 pages) at your own pace between our first meeting at the 2021 Forum and Webinar 6 in March 2022.
8. Write a ten-page paper, integrating what you learned in the 2021-2022 Discipling Leaders Year-Round Mentoring Network, outlining a strategic, workable plan for multiplying mature disciplers within your sphere of influence. You will be asked to give an oral presentation of your paper to the other participants in your group at the 2022 Pre-Forum Conference meeting.

THE 2021 FORUM: Due to the coronavirus pandemic, all participants will meet Online for a four-day private Network at the 2021 European Leadership Forum taking place each day from Sunday, 16 May, until Wednesday, 19 May. Participants will also have an individual Zoom meeting with John and a separate one with Wojtek during the week of the Forum.

THE 2021 DECEMBER RETREAT: All participants will meet with John and Wojtek near Barcelona for a 4-day retreat in December 2021 (exact dates TBD). The participant fees for the retreat are 200 Euros, or 150 Euros for scholarship recipients. For the retreat, non-scholarship recipients also have the option, which must be chosen in the application form, of paying 240 Euros in order to stay in a single room. Participants are also responsible for their own travel expenses.

THE 2022 FORUM: All participants will meet with John and Wjtek in Wisła, Poland for a Pre-Forum Conference (20-21 May). Each participant will present a summary of his 10-page strategy for multiplying mature disciplemakers within his sphere of influence in order that John and the other participants might provide beneficial feedback. *The fees for the 2022 Pre-Forum Conference are 70 Euros for a Double Room and 90 Euros for a Single Room, or 40 Euros for scholarship recipients.*

2021 DISCIPLEMAKING LEADERS YEAR-ROUND MENTORING NETWORK PROGRAM

DAY 1: *Orientation to the Mentoring Group and Network Night*

The purpose of this introductory session is to introduce you to the new, incoming class of 2021-2022. Our first and highest priority will be to get to know one another's story, including brief details related to education, marriage & family, spiritual life, ministry, and vital interests. In addition, John will provide an overview of the Year-Round programme and set the stage for engaging in a learning process which has been carefully designed to address the most important ideas and best practices related to biblical discipleship.

During our first day together, you will also be introduced to ELF's vision and strategy, and to the outstanding books you will be reading during the year. Furthermore, we will discuss this *Syllabus* and our Network's *Orientation* document and answer the questions you have about any facet of the programme.

During *Network Night*, we will consider the topic of *Building Healthy Relationships*, including what the Bible says about the *Power of Words*. With engaging discussion and team-building exercises, this evening is intended to help our group begin the year-long journey of knowing and loving one another. A powerful illustration and model for developing interpersonal relationships, which is essential for all healthy discipleship groups, will also be presented.

DAY 2: *Biblical and Theological Foundations of Discipleship*

Historically, many organizations have gradually shifted from their original vision and become something quite different in the following generations. The initial mission is forgotten - even scorned; and the new, fully embraced and promoted. Jesus Christ, however, never abolished or modified His strategy for world evangelization or implied that the task could be accomplished through programs or mass evangelism alone. Any possibility of success would ride on the commitment of His followers who believe in and practice "spiritual multiplication," the exponential growth of the body of Christ that occurs when mature believers lead others to Christ and then disciple them until they themselves grow to maturity in Christ and are trained to effectively live out their faith before the watching world. Forming a solid biblical and theological foundation for discipleship will help us answer the question that every generation of believers must ask: "Will my ministry be built upon pragmatic and methodological concerns or upon careful exegetical activity related to the life and ministry of Jesus Christ?" Establishing a sound biblical and theological framework for discipleship will ensure that what we do and say in the name of Christ will have lasting value and preserve His strategy for lasting fruitfulness.

What Jesus' Disciples Need to Learn and The New Testament Idea of a Teacher

By definition, disciples are learners. The prevalent word used in the New Testament for *learn* has the basic meaning “to direct one’s mind to something.” An intellectual process is always implied. A disciple, then, is one who thinks, who concentrates, and who prayerfully apprehends what His Master wants him to be, to know, or to do as revealed in the Bible. Once the biblical vision of learning has been established, much that is challenging about discipleship will be easily resolved. The insights gained will provide the context for determining the unique patterns of discipleship that can be embraced by each participant for discipleship groups and movements within their own sphere of influence.

The Relationship Between Evangelism and Discipleship

In this session, we will discuss the Great Commission as recorded in Matthew 28:18-20. After carefully exegeting and discussing Jesus’ well-known command and examining the specific language used in the text, we will consider how the Apostles understood His directive to take the gospel to every tongue, tribe, and nation. Then, we will reflect on the implications for contemporary ministry. Finally, we will discuss how wrong interpretations of this passage directly impact the church’s mission in and to the world.

The Language of Disciplemaking and the Ten Primary Reasons Christians Do Not Reproduce During this session, we will examine 13 specific Greek words which tell a story about the process of disciplemaking. Closing out the day, we will address the important question, “What prevents believers from spiritually reproducing?”

DAY 3: Biblical Foundations, Vision, and Outcomes

Definitions are important. It has been said that the word *discipleship* has as many definitions as there are believers. This session will lay out a biblical foundation and vision for discipleship from which to engage in the process of investing our lives in others until they grow to spiritual maturity and begin to spiritually reproduce.

The Purpose and Benefits of Discipleship

At the start of our day, we will be asking and discussing the question, “What is discipleship?” Definitions are important and are foundational to one’s worldview and lifestyle. It has been said that the word *discipleship* has as many definitions as there are believers. This session will lay out a biblical foundation and vision for discipleship from which to engage in the process of investing our lives in others until they grow to spiritual maturity and begin to spiritually reproduce.

A Profile of a Discipled Person

An important discussion on the use of your imagination will follow in our afternoon session and is designed to help you learn how to develop a biblical profile of a discipled person. Completing this task will give you a clear picture of the kind of person you are seeking to “build” by the grace of Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Preparing to Lead

In our final session of the day, we will consider the character, calling, and commitment of a discipleship leader, examine the costs associated with forming and leading a discipleship group, discuss the key tasks of disciplemakers, and emphasize twelve characteristics of strong life-shapers.

DAY 4: Jesus Model of Discipleship, Elements of Group Life, and Group Formation

On our final day, we will consider how Jesus’ model of training the Twelve is the model for contemporary discipleship. The Gospel records reveal that Jesus invested approximately 3½ years of His life with a small group of men whom he called His Apostles. His purpose was clear: that they might become like Him and do what He asked them to do. During their apprenticeship, He loved them, taught them how to live, and prepared them to minister in His name throughout the world. When these men were first recruited by our Lord, they had no idea what was before them, neither the severe trials nor the intense blessings. Sometimes stoned, shipwrecked,

imprisoned, beaten, mocked, and banished, they continued to obey the call of their Lord to disciple the nations. Person by person, city by city, and nation by nation, they preached and taught in the synagogues, arenas, marketplaces, and homes, then instructed those who received the free gift of eternal life in the words and ways of Jesus until they reached maturity (Col. 1:28-29).

The Twelve had been well prepared. These untrained and uneducated men had become like their Master. It is not surprising, then, that their mission was not only centred on winning the masses, but on following Jesus' method of working with a few who, in time, would become spiritual reproducers themselves. For instance, Paul discipled Timothy and Titus; Peter trained John Mark; and John personally discipled the Christian leader and martyr, Polycarp.

Jesus' training had been so thorough and His strategy for world domination so effective, that by the end of the second century, the gospel had spread to every part of the Roman empire. Today, the gospel continues to be proclaimed around the world in churches, stadiums, prisons, and homes; in villages, rural areas, and densely populated cities; by pastors, evangelists, missionaries, an equipped laity, and through a wide variety of media. Much is being done to win the masses. But we must not forget, nor ignore, Jesus' strategy for winning the world.

Group Formation (Selection) and a Sample Invitation to Discipleship

In this last portion of our day, we will consider another vitally important aspect of the discipleship process. How do we go about the process of selecting the right kinds of people to become a part of our groups?

Day 5: The Power of Spiritual Multiplication, Sanctification, Rationale for Discipleship, Evaluation, and Final Consideration

The Power of Spiritual Multiplication

There is a great difference between *adding* people to the Church (even on a daily basis) and building *multiplying* laborers. During this session, we will advance the biblical idea that the people we disciple *can* and *should* become fruitful to the third and fourth generations.

Sanctification

We urge that every disciplemaker become a student of sanctification, the work of God's free grace. What do we need to know about the process of spiritual growth and development as given to us in the Scriptures?

The Purpose and Benefits of Discipleship

Why should believers be involved in discipleship? What purpose does it serve? What benefits does it offer? In this session, we will discuss the rationale for discipleship, along with the most important benefits that accrue to those who participate in the discipling process.

How to Use Your Summer Wisely

During these final sessions of our Network, we will briefly review what we have learned and discussed during the Forum, form accountability partners within our YRM, complete an online ELF evaluation, finalize instructions for the 10-page strategic paper, offer final comments, and close our time together in prayer.

"And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.'" (Mt. 28:18-20).

Webinar One: A Biblical Theology of Discipleship

September 2021: 18:30-20:30 GMT (exact time TBA)

1. The **total number of pages** to be read for this webinar: **131** (number of weeks in which to read the material: 15, from the Forum until Webinar One). **Written assignments:** a 1-page synopsis, 3 definitions, and a post-webinar outline.
2. The first 15 minutes of the meeting will be devoted to a brief devotion, prayer, and answering questions you may have about the assignments.
3. Read and study *Unearthing Historic Discipleship* by John Musselman, downloadable at: <https://tji.org/classic-discipleship.html> in preparation for the webinar (56 pages).
4. Read Part I (31 pages) and Part II (44 pages) of *Following the Master: A Biblical Theology of Discipleship* by Michael J. Wilkins, PhD. (Grand Rapids: ZondervanPublishingHouse, 1992).
5. Write a one-page synopsis on your understanding of how Jesus' training of the Twelve is foundational for contemporary discipleship. Include your "take-aways" – the truths and principles that you want to incorporate into your life and ministry. Email your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
6. Define the following terms and submit one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek:
 - a. Disciple
 - b. Disciplemaker
 - c. Spiritual Multiplication
7. Take some time to personally reflect and meditate on the following questions (no written assignment):
 - a. How can a comprehensive understanding of the life of Christ and the way He trained the Twelve deepen and multiply your discipleship ministry?
 - b. How does a comprehensive understanding of the life of Christ challenge modern and popular notions of small group discipleship as witnessed in the church today?
 - c. Why is it important to develop a biblical theology of discipleship?
 - d. After reading Michael Wilkins' book, what will be different about your discipleship practices in the future?
 - e. Have you ever spent time studying the life of Christ, either in a course taken or books read? How much have Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John shaped your thinking about discipleship?

8. **After** our meeting online, write an outline that synthesizes the content from the previous session which you could use to teach others on the biblical foundations of discipleship. This will be due two weeks after the webinar and should be submitted to John and Wojtek.

Webinar Two: Vision and Disciplemaking

October 2021: 18:30-20:30 GMT (exact time TBA)

1. The **total number of pages** to be read for this webinar: **92** (number of weeks in which to read the material: 3½, from Webinar One to Webinar Two). **Written assignments:** 2 or 3 ideas from Adsit's book, a 1-page summary on vision, *Profile of a Discipled Person*, post-webinar outline.
2. The first 15 minutes of the meeting will be devoted to a brief devotion, prayer, and answering questions you may have about the assignments.
3. Review *Clarifying Your Vision* by John Musselman, downloadable at: <https://tji.org/classic-discipleship.html> in preparation for the webinar (22 pages).
4. Read "Habit 2: Begin with the End in Mind" (50 pages) in *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People* by Stephen R. Covey (New York: Simon & Schuster, 1989. 319 pages. Available in paperback only). At some point in your life, we would encourage you to read the entire book but, for this webinar, our focus will be on Habit 2 only (no written assignment).
5. Read Chapter 20: *Training Objective #12: Vision* (20 pages) in Christopher B. Adsit's book, *Personal Disciplemaking* (Orlando, FL: Campus Crusade for Christ, 1996. 384 pages; paperback only). List two or three ideas that will be beneficial as you disciple others and submit them to John via email on or before 1 October.
6. In a one-page summary, indicate why you believe it is vital to have a clear vision before embarking on any endeavor, including discipleship. Begin to formulate your personal vision and email your assignment on or before 1 October to John.
7. Develop a *Profile of a Discipled Person* (i.e., a functionally mature disciple) by answering the question, "What am I trying to produce?" Submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
8. William Carey said, "Expect great things from God; attempt great things for God." What great thing are you attempting for God in the area of disciplemaking? Be prepared to discuss this during the webinar with John and the other participants (no written assignment).
9. **After** our meeting online, write an outline that synthesizes the content of the session that you could use to teach on discipleship. This will be due one week after the webinar and should be submitted to John and Wojtek via email.

Webinar Three: Preparing to Lead & Becoming a Small Group Architect

November 2021: 18:30-20:30 GMT, (exact time TBA)

1. The **total number of pages** to be read for this webinar: **37** (number of weeks in which to read the material: 3½, from Webinar Two to Webinar Three). **Written assignments:** manufactured item, 1-page discipleship model, post-webinar paper.
2. The first 15 minutes of the meeting will be devoted to a brief devotion, prayer, and answering questions you may have about the assignments.
3. Read *Preparing to Lead* by John Musselman, downloadable at <http://tji.org/classic-discipleship.html>, in preparation for the webinar (13 pages).
4. Review *Becoming a Small Group Architect* by John Musselman, downloadable at <http://tji.org/classic-discipleship.html> in preparation for the webinar (24 pages).
5. Conduct a general study of any manufactured item (e.g., a food product, beverage, car, computer, garment, airplane, etc.). Without getting technical, describe the process of transforming raw materials into a finished product. Using your powers of observation, note how long it takes for the item to be manufactured, how many people it takes to produce the item, what raw materials have to be utilized in the production, etc. In no more than a page, describe what you learned about the principle: *Product Determines Process*. Submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
6. Based upon your reading and study, design a discipleship model that incorporates the various elements that you deem important for creating an environment for building mature believers. Limit your diagram to one page and submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
7. Be prepared to discuss *Biblical Accountability* and how you would incorporate it into your discipleship groups (no written assignment).
8. Be prepared to discuss *Spiritual Disciplines* and the purpose they serve in the discipling process (no written assignment).
9. **After** our meeting online, synthesize the content of the session, take on the role of a “discipleship group architect” and improve your initial model for discipleship groups that you could promote within your sphere of influence. This will be due on or before two weeks after the webinar and should be emailed to John and Wojtek.

Webinar Four: Selecting Your Curriculum

January 2022 18:30-20:30 GMT (exact time TBA)

1. The **total number of pages** to be read for this webinar: **240** (number of weeks in which to read the material: 8, from Webinar Three to Webinar Four). **Written assignments:** 1-page “Wilson” paper, 1-year curriculum design, “limitations of books” paper, post-webinar paper.
2. The first 15 minutes of the meeting will be devoted to a brief devotion, prayer, and answering questions you may have about the assignments.

3. Review *Selecting Your Curriculum* by John Musselman, downloadable at <http://tji.org/classic-discipleship.html> in preparation for the webinar (4 pages).
4. Read Chapter 8: *The Growth of Individual Disciples* (26 pages) in Carl W. Wilson's book, *With Christ in the School of Disciple Building* (Colorado Springs, CO: NavPress, 2009). Write a one-page response paper and indicate how your curriculum choices in the future will be informed by Wilson's ideas. Submit your assignment on or before 7 January.
5. Read Chapter 2: *Association* (10 pages) in Robert Coleman's book, *The Master Plan of Evangelism* (Grand Rapids, MI: Fleming H. Revell Company, 1997). Note how your curriculum choices in the future will be informed by Coleman's ideas (no written assignment).
6. Read *Discipleship of the Mind* by James W. Sire (Downers Grove, Illinois: InterVarsity Press, 1990. 200 pages. Available in paperback only). Note how your curriculum choices in the future will be informed by Sire's ideas (no written assignment).
7. Suppose you knew you only had one year to be with someone you were discipling. Using the *Growth Objective Worksheet* in *Selecting Your Curriculum* (see number 2 above), design a 1-year curriculum that would lead him to greater maturity in Christ. Submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
8. Jesus took 3½ years to disciple the Twelve. Given today's social and cultural norms, what are some of the things you could place in another person's life over a 3-year period? Be prepared to discuss your thoughts with John and the other participants during the webinar (no written assignment).
9. Biblical discipleship must be both *individual* and *corporate*. Be prepared to differentiate between the two and explain why both are necessary in the discipling process (no written assignment).
10. In a paragraph, describe the limitations of books, workbooks, articles, etc. in shaping another person's life. What are some other ways in which God disciplines His people? Submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
11. **After** our meeting online, develop a 3-year discipleship curriculum that you can use in your ministry of discipleship. This will be due two weeks after the webinar and should be emailed to John and Wojtek.

Webinar Five: Group Formation and Agreements

February 2022: 18:30-20:30 GMT (exact dates TBA)

1. The **total number of pages** to be read for this webinar: **154** (number of weeks in which to read the material: 4½, from Webinar Four to Webinar Five). **Written assignments:** two 1-page papers on Roberta Hestenes' book, a 1-page synopsis of Ogden and Coleman on "Selection," post-webinar paper.
2. The first 15 minutes of the meeting will be devoted to a brief devotion, prayer, and answering questions you may have about the assignments.
3. Read *Forming Your Group* and *Approving the Blueprint* (both parts) by John Musselman, downloadable at <http://tji.org/classic-discipleship.html> in preparation for the webinar (45 pages).

4. Read *Using the Bible in Groups* by Roberta Hestenes (Philadelphia: The Westminster Press, 1983. 109 pages. Available in paperback only). Pay special attention to Chapter One: *Why Small Groups?* and Chapter Two: *Beginning a Small Group* in preparation for the webinar. Write a one-page response paper after reading these two chapters, noting at least three personal applications to your own ministry in discipling. Submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
5. In a separate assignment, review Roberta Hestenes' book, *Using the Bible in Groups*, and integrate John's *Approving the Blueprint* and Hestenes' emphasis on *Contracting*. Write a 1-page response paper on the importance of selecting people for your groups who are willing to abide by certain obligations. Submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
6. What are the common threads on *Selection* that run through the writings of Robert Coleman and Greg Ogden? In a 1-page synopsis, critique these men's ideas in the light of Christ's selection process. Submit your assignment one week before the webinar to John and Wojtek.
7. Make a preliminary list of some men that the Lord has placed on your heart to disciple. You will not be asked to provide names to John or the other participants but will be encouraged to share where you are in the process of forming a discipleship group (if you do not already have one).
8. **After** our meeting online, synthesize the content of the session and modify an existing discipleship group contract (e.g., *An Invitation to Discipleship*) or create a new one for your personal and extended ministry in equipping other disciplers. This will be due two weeks after the webinar and should be emailed to John.

Webinar Six: The Process of Building Mature, Reproducing Disciples

3. Read *Building Mature Disciples* by John Musselman, downloadable at <http://tji.org/classic-discipleship.html> in preparation for the webinar (9 pages).
4. Read John's *An Invitation to Discipleship*, downloadable at http://tji.org/downloads/An_Invitation_to_Discipleship.pdf (28 pages).
5. Read *The Making of a Leader* by J. Robert Clinton (Colorado Springs: NavPress, 1988. 211 pages. Available in paperback only) in preparation for the webinar (no written assignment).
6. The entire webinar today will be devoted to discussing the process of discipleship and will be informed by the assigned reading. A thorough reading of the material will enhance the learning environment and should assist each participant in walking with Christ and seeking to invest what he has been given with others.

7. **After** our meeting online, write a ten-page paper (integrating what you learned in the private, 4-day Network during the 2021 Forum, through the webinars, and through your reading) outlining a strategic, workable plan for multiplying mature disciplemakers within your sphere of influence. This will be due **7 April 2022** and should be emailed to John and Wojtek. Then, at the 2022 Pre-Forum Seminar, each participant will be asked to present a summary of his 10-page strategy (including implementation steps for the first year) for multiplying mature disciplemakers in order that John and other participants might provide helpful feedback.
